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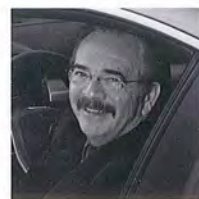

The design of Naumi is stylish, democratic, young at heart yet exudes mature sophistication: a reflection of the diversity of Singapore itself.

The interior design is infused with the spirit of Naumi, with exclusive bespoke elements. For example, the reception counter is designed as a sculpture, the chandelier is made of thousands of leaves, inspired by filigree design, and the monolithic, glowing vanity in the guestrooms are both functional and decorative.

Locally designed artwork adorns the interior, most notably the video installation in the lobby, which features a lady's face consisting of hundreds of videos capturing the everyday activities in Singapore, from local folks enjoying their daily coffee, to the glitzy MBS architecture.

Suites are inspired by icons such as Coco Chanel and Andy Warhol, while the rooftop bar offers views of the best city skyline, transforming from day time lounge area to a glittering bar in the evening.

As a renovation project, the total budget for Airland Hotel challenged the designers to make the best use of the existing space, which is shaped by curvy architecture.

With the introduction of a natural landscape into interiors and by utilising a central open space with natural ventilation and sunlight, the design intent was to create an interior space that naturally blends pure style and romantic ambience.

In the pure white and minimalist space, wood grains and shadows become the dominant lines in the lobby. In the buffer zone between the atrium and the western restaurant, there is a natural screen resembling a bamboo forest, lit by sea animal light fixtures to provide privacy and create an elegant ambience. In the restaurant, reflective glass, matt stone surfaces and natural linen form texture contrasts. High gloss stone contrasts with wood grain gradations enrich the texture of the space.
